1. Special consideration including application fees

First of all, we would like to request that special consideration be applied to small cities as well as small cultural and linguistic communities which do not intend to compete with general commercial TLDs such as .com or new brand TLDs in general. This includes the reduction of application fee of \$185,000 and annual fee of \$25,000. The local cities as well as cultural and linguistic communities are diverse in size and many are economically small thus the current level of fees is not affordable for them. However, we understand that lower but appropriate application fee is still needed in order to prevent excessive applications.

2. Objection fees be exempted for governments

We request that ICANN should not impose any fees to individual governments including local governments which intend to submit objections to individual applications. We believe such objections are based on public interest and therefore should be exempted from general commercial practices.
