ICANN GNSO SCOPE

OVERALL INQUIRY ON ICANN'S MISSION

 Is it within ICANN's Mission as specified in the ICANN Bylaws?

"The mission of ICANN is to coordinate, at the overall level, the global Internet's systems of unique identifiers, and in particular to ensure the stable and secure operation of the Internet's unique identifier systems."

- In particular, ICANN coordinates:
 - Allocation and assignment of the three unique identifiers for the Internet

Domain names


IP addresses and autonomous system numbers Protocol port and parameter numbers


- Operation and evolution of the DNS root name server system
- Policy development reasonably and appropriately related to these technical functions


ICANN GNSO SCOPE

- Is the topic consistent with ICANN's Core Values as described in the Bylaws?
 - Among ICANN's core values:
 - Preserving and enhancing the operational stability, reliability, security, and interoperability of the Internet
 - Introducing and promoting competition in domain name registrations
 - Where feasible and appropriate, depending on the market to promote and sustain competition
 - Limiting ICANN's activities to those activities requiring or significantly benefiting from global coordination
- GNSO-Specific Inquiry
 - The GNSO is responsible for developing and recommending to the Board substantive policies relating to gTLDs










Section 4.2.3- Resolution of Disputes

- Domain registration dispute resolution policies that take into account use may be appropriate for GNSO policy
 - Example- UDRP combines bad faith registration and bad faith use
 - Examples of Registration Abuse-
 - False WHOIS
 - Stolen Credit Cards used to Purchase domains
- Dispute resolution policies involving registration abuse alone without taking into account "use" may be appropriate for GNSO policy


Policies that prescribe or limit the price of Registrar Services (3.7.9)


