

INTA Internet Committee Comments on the .MADRID Application for an Approved Launch Program

November 2, 2014

INTA notes that the Comunidad de Madrid, the Registry Operator for the .MADRID TLD, has submitted an application for an Approved Launch Program (ALP) pursuant to section 4.5.2 of the Trademark Clearinghouse (TMCH) Right Protection Mechanism Requirements (RPM Requirements). This ALP consists in particular of a proposed Public Administrators Program and a Parallel Sunrise Program, both of which would be in addition to the proposed Pioneer Name Program, which appears to be a Qualified Launch Program (QLP) under the QLP Addendum to the RPM Requirements.

As stated by the applicant, the .MADRID ALP appears to be very similar to the ALP application submitted with respect to the .PARIS Registry, on which INTA previously commented.¹ In its comments, INTA expressed concern that the proposed .PARIS ALP might undermine the existing right protection mechanisms and, therefore, risked contributing to intellectual property infringement and/or consumer confusion. To the extent that the two programs are identical, therefore, INTA considers that the comments submitted in respect of the .PARIS ALP may apply equally to the .MADRID ALP. However, we note that it appears there may be some differences between the two programs. Consequently, INTA intends to comment more fully during the Reply period, after having reviewed the proposed .MADRID ALP further.
